Entitlement

The Scottish Government recognises that to compete successfully in a rapidly changing global economy, workforce Scotland needs equipped with a broad range of skills, knowledge and attributes meet modern employment to and self-employment opportunities. Colleges have an important role to play in delivering both vocational and essential generic skills which employers expect in the workplace.

All Scottish colleges are committed to increasing the attainment levels in core and essential skills across all courses at all levels. Skills and attributes will be clearly identifiable by staff, students and employers in a common taxonomy of skills.

The Curriculum for Excellence, in particular 'Building the Curriculum 4', entitles all students to be given the opportunity to develop their essential skills, with a strong focus on literacy and numeracy. Colleges and 'teachers of skills' will equip and support our students in gaining these through the following:

- Design a curriculum where there is a major focus on the essential/core skills entitlement for all students which allows them to progress to the highest SCQF level they are able to achieve
- Improve attainment in core skills, especially, literacy and numeracy at all levels in the curriculum in order to address the National Skills Agenda for Scotland
- Create a college experience which offers opportunities to enhance student skills development in different contexts (student engagement)
- Ensure that students and staff recognise the importance of essential skills and employability attributes and can identify where these are developed within the curriculum
- Ensure that all students are able to articulate and evidence the development of their essential skills and employability attributes throughout their college experience
- Ensure full college engagement, where staff work collaboratively with essential/core skills teams, in the development of the learning experience
- Introduce an additional focus on essential skills at all levels, thus better supporting our students in a smooth and confident progression to further learning at college, transition to Higher Education and towards future employment or self-employment.

In summary, all of our learners are entitled to develop skills and attributes that equip them for life in innovative, creative and meaningful ways, and to the highest level, throughout their college experience with the support of the whole staff team.
